# 'Peace to all who enter here' A visit to Home of Love by Anita Chan

It's the call of love that put us to work - a trip to Shamshuipo to witness the services of those who follow the footsteps of Mother Teresa. Under a torrential downpour a small group of CUWO members traveled to the shabby part of Shamshuipo. Walking precariously underneath the flyover, we dodged the rain from above. We bought three chunky bags of vegetables from a stall along the pathway for the day's needs in the Home.

Bringing along some old clothes and household articles, we arrived at Cheong Chit House in Nam Cheong Estate, Shamshuipo. The sisters in their habits received us with smiles and introduced the basic functions of the Home. There are totally eleven sisters running the Home with a provision of around fifty beds accommodating both males and females needing immediate refuge. Security in the women's dormitory is not under tight security, presenting a hidden threat to the overwhelming peace. Two separate dormitories (one male and the other female) on the ground floor take up most of the space. On the 1<sup>st</sup> floor, there is a tiny chapel with a confessional and two flat units serving as the domicile for the sisters.

In addition to the 'live-in' service provided by the sisters, free meals are provided for those in dire need of food. As reflected by one of the sisters, they will turn out those drunkards, drug abusers or smokers from the Home. Those who freely 'come and go' are believed to be clean in the Name of God. The busy, well-trained sisters move like bees between the two floors, where their strong faith in peace and love can be perceived. Their faces show that love does not measure, but just gives.

Welcome to another arts-filled year in Hong Kong. Whether you're a new or returning member of the campus community, please take a moment to check out the vibrant cultural scene in Hong Kong which offers one of the best performing and visual arts hubs in the world at an affordable price.

In a basic introduction, I've listed contact numbers and web sites for the major venues around town. It's easy to buy tickets and even book in advance to enjoy a night out on the town, culturally-speaking. If you live on campus or nearby, many events take place at Shatin Town Hall. Another major venue is TST's Cultural Centre, a direct trip via the MTR (University) to TST East, Exit J through Sogo and up the stairs to the Cultural Centre complex. Chinese University's Music Department also offers many free concerts with a very high standard –they are held in a beautiful little concert hall, the Lee Hysan, found in Chung Chi College's *Esther Lee*, the main administration building. The programmes sponsored by CU's Cultural Centre at Sir Run Run Shaw can be found in a separate brochure available all over campus.

PLEASE take advantage of Hong Kong's cultural scene; the value for money is incredible and unparalleled elsewhere in the world. See you at the concerts/movies/exhibitons. etc.!

(Note: LCSD refers to the Leisure and Cultural Services Department, the government sponsor of most arts events in Hong Kong)

The APA is Hong Kong's conservatory for the arts –it offers many free concerts and exhibitons throughout the year that showcase the students as well as the teachers' talents. Other non-APA events such as theatre and ballet often take place in APA's Lyric Theatre.

The actual film festival takes place around Easter each year but has expanded to include regular mini-festivals with themes centered on a particular director or film genre. Theatre (HK Arts Centre), the Space Museum (TST's Cultural Centre), the Science Museum Lecture Hall (HK Science Museum in TST East) or the HK Film Archive Theatre (Sai Wan Ho). Bei Shan Tang was the private studio name of the late Dr. LEE Jung Sen (1915-2007). Dr. Lee had and his family have unwaveringly supported CUHK from its founding in the early 1960s, being instrumental in building the Institute of Chinese Studies (including the Art Museum), donating art and antique objects, establishing professorships, and sponsoring research projects and scholarships. The majority of the Bei Shan Tang collection, has been generously donated to the Art Museum. This exhibition introduces the cream of this gift. The content is rich and comprehensive ranging from paintings, calligraphy, ink rubbings, jade, ceramics, to sculpture, scholarly objects, bamboo carvings, seals and bronzes. The display will be installed in the four galleries of the Art Museum with the following themes: I - painting, II - ceramics and decorative art, III - calligraphy, and IV - rubbings and epigraphy.
