'An Invitation – Summer Teaching Experience in China



Dear Fellow Colleagues/Friends,

We are seeking volunteers to assist us with teaching English in China for one or two weeks of the summer vacation. The experience involves teaching English to an enthusiastic group of children aged 8 - 12 in Fujian Village, China. You would be teaching a class of around 20 children. The number of children who can take part in the programme depends on the number of teacher volunteers. This is our third year assisting with this scholarship, and the enthusiasm of the children and hospitality of the village really is a great gift to anyone willing to be involved.

Accommodation, meals and bus fare are provided. Teaching resources are also provided although if you do have any activities of your own, they would be greatly appreciated. Brief meetings will be held prior to the experience, in order to discuss and decide what to teach.

There is an opportunity for a weekend tour in nearby scenic spots. The cost of this tour is also covered.

While dates are still being finalized, the experience is planned for some time around 22/7/2007 - 4/8/2007.

Save Power, Save Money, Save the Planet.



How high was your last electricity bill? Do vou consider vourself

to be a careful user of electricity or perhaps a little

wasteful? By now, most of us know that the amount of electricity we use is directly related to both the amount of money leaving our pockets and the level of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere - so, by wasting electricity, we are poorer in more ways than one.

Information on how to save electricity is widely available and mostly common sense - use the quick cycle on your washing machine, turn off lights and air-conditioners when leaving the room, use power-save on your computers if you leave them on at night (or better still, turn them off) and use energy saving light bulbs. Most of us try, with varying degrees of success, to follow this advice. Some are more determined than others - California Governor, Arnold Schwarzenegger, for example, said in an interview, that he removes the light bulbs in his house when his kids forget to turn them off, to teach them the value of this resource and their responsibility to our world - strict dad, eh?

Now, here's something we can do (although I don't intend removing light-bulbs yet!). Join the Friends of the Earth "Power Smart" competition. The competition is open to families, schools and large organizations that can show a cut of at least 3% between electricity bills from June to August 2007, when compared with the same months last year. The prizes are small - souvenirs and public recognition of your efforts, but the gains are large - the reduction in your own spending on electricity and your contribution to a better atmosphere.

Hong Kong offers an amazing array of events all summer and this is just a brief summary of some of the main ones. Get all the details at URBTIX.

International Arts Carnival - this amazing scope of events lasting from 4 July until 12 August is not just for kids, even though at first glance, that's what it appears to be. The very colourful brochures (both large and small!) indicate an enormous variety of shows, concerts, workshops, movies and museum activities. Within the main brochure (large, yellow and with cute things popping out of a magician's hat, you'll find a pull-out "Activities Handbook" with clever "workshop diaries" that clearly spell out dates, times and venues where you can find something going on in every corner of Hong Kong. There's no excuse for the kids to be strapped to the computer playing video games when they can take part both actively and passively in so many fun events. I can't begin to describe how interesting it all looks and it's clear that someone at Leisure & Cultural Services Department has spent all year organizing this. 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Summer Reading

When I think of holidays, I think of lazing around by a pool in an exotic location with a good book in my hand and not a care in the world. As is my own personal lot, I can forget the pool, exotic location and magical disappearance of my day-to-day problems

but I can indulge in a good book or three, if I'm lucky. When it comes to books, I'm the book buffet queen – stick anything in front of me and I'll plough on to the end. Some might say my tastes are eclectic; others might call me a book hound – either way, I'll read anything from fiction to philosophy if the mood takes me. Here are a few of my personal picks, all available through www.paddyfield.com

Fiction

The read of the year (eagerly awaited in my household and thousands more, no doubt) is the final book in the Harry Potter series. Love it or loathe it, this definitely falls into the "ripping yarn" category. *Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows* by JK Rowling will be released on July 21st. The book may still be able to stand alone as a good read, but will be better, I'm sure, for those who know a little of Harry's wizarding world. I won't speculate as to the final outcome (except, of course, the hope that Voldemort and his cronies will get their just desserts) but I will guarantee a noticeable reduction in computer and hand-held games usage for at least two weeks after publication.

Biography

Considering that I'm "math-phobic" my enjoyment of this book is a testament to Dava Sobel's excellent writing and passion for her subject. *Longitude* tells the story of an 18th Century clock maker, John Harrison's quest to calculate longitude, using a simple clock. Reviled and cheated by the scientific community, this book narrates one man's heroic efforts to further scientific knowledge and save countless lives at sea. It may not seem like a page-turner, but it's got more double-dealing than a modern soap opera, a valiant hero and enough villainous treachery to make this true story an incredibly good read.

Fantasy Fiction

In my book (pardon the pun), the weirder the better, and they don't come much weirder than Tom Holt. Never mind suspending disbelief, this author sends it packing for the duration. His heroes are hapless, his villains patently absurd and it's often hard to tell the difference. Norse gods, elves, genies, devils, dragons and goblins are just a few of the characters that inhabit his wacky world and somehow make it believable, as good and evil duke it out in the most outlandish situations and places. I have read most of his comic works and recommend them all, but for starters, I suggest *The Portable Door* (the first in the JG Wells & Co series) where we learn that lawyers are no where near as boring as we thought and goblins can be quite fetching, and *Here Comes the Sun,* which gives a whole new meaning to the idea of Global Warming. **HAPPY READING** 9


