## **East Gate Blues**

You might be aware that the CUHK East Gate, exit from lower campus to Tolo Highway and Ma On Shan, has been moved a few meters north along Science Park Road since September 1<sup>st</sup>. This relocation means staff members using that entrance for daily access to CUHK have to pay more for petrol and drive through hazardous bends and slopes at least twice a day. The Campus Community News, acting as a conduit in the campus community, has been in contact with Mr. David Lim, Director of the Campus Development Office (CDO), on this issue. Here below, is a summary of Mr. Lim's written responses to the questions put to him and CCN's thoughts on this issue.

#### Q1. Purpose of relocating the East Gate:

**A:** For safety reasons: the original set up, where the Guard Booth was located on one side of the road, was dangerous. Security guards faced the risk of being hit by incoming (or outgoing) vehicles while giving entry tickets and/or collecting payments. **CCN:** To our knowledge, in the past decade, there have been no reported accidents in the vicinity of the original East Gate. Yet since its relocation in September 1<sup>st</sup>, there have been unofficial reports of dangerous near-collision events and at least one accident requiting police involvement.

On the positive side, the present arrangement links additional buildings to the main campus. These buildings include the Chinese University Institute of Biotechnology, Academic Building #2, and PC-3 Lab. The relocated East Gate facilitates access from these premises to the main campus any time, while in the past, anyone wishing to access the Campus from these facilities had to detour all the way to Hong Kong Jockey Club (HKJC) when the East Gate was closed.

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**Q2.** Did this arrangement go through any public consultation? If so, when and how? If not, why not? **A:** The University Administration, through the Chinese University Employees' General Union (CUEGU) has

been looking into ways to improve the safety of security guards manning the East Gate for many years. Unfortunately the site at the old entrance prohibits the widening of the carriageway to accommodate a booth at the centre of the road. The issue has also been discussed on various occasions and within committees and the current solution was agreed and put to implementation.

**CCN:** Mr. Lim also suggested that he and Mr. Philip Wong (Director of Security) could discuss this issue with campus residents at the October 3<sup>rd</sup> Coffee Morning of the Chinese University Women's Organization. The CUWO administration decided this would not work as members would find the time slot too inconvenient. Also, there was concern that the CUWO membership may not be sufficiently representative of the campus community and users of the East Gate as a whole.

**Note**: Guards at the East Gate issue about 500 entry tickets daily to vehicles coming to CU campus; there are no data on the number of CU staff members using the East Gate on a daily basis i.e. staff members living off-campus, 'A' labels entitle them to drive in and out of CU campus freely.

**Q3:.** There are at least two dangerous curves en route to the gate. Is this road design permanent? **A:** The two road bends are being improved by the Estates Management Office (EMO). Certain tasks in the project are beyond our control, i.e. relocation of street lamp post.... etc. The improvement project is scheduled to be completed in early October.

**Q4:** Do you have a schedule of different stages of the project i.e. when will the old traffic light be relocated to the new road juncture? How long will the lorries be using the route?

**A:** Officials at the Transport Department state that surveys and observations are being conducted to study the feasibility of relocating the traffic light to the road juncture driving out to Science Park Road. There have been two feedback results since the operation of the new gate. One favours removal of the traffic light for avoidance of unnecessary queuing and the other wants to keep the traffic light for safety. Proper road signs and labels will be installed by the Civic Engineering Development Department in due course. The lorries are for the site formation of Area 39-- the land which the University is applying to the Government for 334 development. Under the scheme, the project is scheduled to be completed by end of 2009.

## **Resident's View - Letter to the Editor**

Dear Editor,

I was just wondering whether anybody has brought up the topic of the change in the bottom entrance to CU (Ma Liu Shui). It's a real nuisance and a disaster waiting to happen. The road is completely unsafe (very narrow with lots of heavy trucks and buses); it is time-consuming to drive the extra distance, not to mention the impact on the environment and the high petrol prices. CU has now installed very steep road-bumps that are meaningless to the trucks but quite harmful to the average family car. The traffic lights at the bottom of the old entrance are still in use although they no longer have a purpose.


What is the reason for the change at this entrance? Will this be permanent or just temporary?

There are four rounds as well as gala performances and you can purchase day and night passes to hear the contestants play piano concertos as well as chamber music with the London Chamber Orchestra with conductor, Christopher Warren-Green. The jury panel has such piano luminaries as Pascal Roge, Christina Ortiz, and Hong Kong's own Eleanor Wong of the APA. ## Olympic Spirit in CU - by Anita Chan



August, 2008 marked the historic staging of the Olympics in China, but lucky to say, Hong Kong was also taken over by the Equestrian Olympic events. More gratifyingly, the Chinese University was equally filled with a strong drizzle of Olympic spirit.

The atmosphere at the university station was expectant but relaxed, as the Olympic Equestrian events drew closer. CU friends could feel the extra passion of the Olympics when security guards in different uniforms patrolled the middle of the station and the campus. We welcomed the Olympics with a sense of unexpected wonder and surprise. Swarms of people feverishly arrived at the station for Olympic shuttle buses to transport them to and from the venue. The station became extraordinarily busy, even busier than at

the beginning and end of terms. Local celebrities went largely unnoticed as they rubbed shoulders with the crowd as the event brought a bustling frenzy to the summer days!

Olympic delight reached its zenith with the arrival of CUHK carnival day on August 16<sup>th</sup> in support of the Olympic Games. Widely advertised on public transport and at CU, the carnival received good attendance and the university was packed with an enthusiastic crowd coming from all corners f Hong Kong. The Piazza was splendidly thronged with thrill seekers expecting to receive gifts of the day. Different events were held, such as variety shows, bazaar games for children, friendly matches and exhibitions.

Post Olympic seminars linked with health and sport issues were held in CU. The extended work on this theme helped young people develop a more in-depth knowledge, mixing empiricism with practical advice. The Olympic passion, both preceding and during the event, was undeniably high; nevertheless, the post-event feeling was equally pervasive. This spirit still lingers on in the heart.

It is an honour to have a chance to share this exciting Olympic event held right here in China and the SAR of Hong Kong. China had the highest gold medal tally and Hong Kong played its small part in the Equestrian events. What is more, the Chinese University of Hong Kong also made its small contribution in supporting the events! This move is a significant reminder of the value of working together for a common goal, especially in today's social culture.

The Jockey Club Creative Arts Centre (JCCAC), is a pilot scheme to provide affordable space for local artists to create and showcase their works. Aiming to accommodate 150 Hong Kong artists and art groups under one roof, the JCCAC has fitted out a decommissioned 9-storey Shek Kip Mei factory with art studios, galleries, a black-box theatre, and other facilities. The resident artists and art groups engage in a wide range of art disciplines covering visual and performing arts in media ranging from traditional to contemporary. JCCAC is the first studio centre in Hong Kong.

The group will meet at Admiralty MTR station and take the MTR to Shek Kip Mei. The JCCAC is about a 5minute walk from there. The morning event will start with a presentation by Eddie Lui, followed by a guided tour of the premises and meeting with some of the resident artists and art groups available on the day.

**About the speaker:** A sculptor, Eddie Lui has been involved in the JCCAC since its planning stages. Mr Lui, with his wealth of knowledge and experience in the arts and culture, helped lay solid groundwork for the centre. Mr. Lui has held a number of one-man exhibitions for his own works and taken part in group shows in Hong Kong, the Mainland and internationally. His work has won awards and prizes in a number of art competitions and is included in both public and private collections.


