Bethanie House - Our architectural Heritage Preserved - by Joan Huang

While we in Hong Kong have learned to accept demolition and development as a daily occurrence, we should count ourselves lucky that Bethanie House, one of the city's most beautiful examples of French colonial architecture, has been preserved and restored, and has became the Landmark Heritage campus for the Academy of Performing Arts.

The site was recognized in 2008 by the UNESCO Asia Pacific Heritage Award under the Culture Heritage Conservation Programme. Situated amidst the verdant hills and dairy fields of Pok Fu Lam, the neo-Gothic-style construction was built by the Missions Etrangeres de Paris in 1875. It served as a sanatorium for almost a century, where priests and missionaries from all over Asia were sent to recover from tropical diseases.

Its sister building, Nazareth became the mission's linguistics and printing headquarters in Asia. Between 1894 and 1956 it printed thousands of titles in dozens of Asian languages; contributing to the circulation of Bibles in the region. During the Japanese Occupation, the site was used as the headquarters for the Japanese military police.

While Nazareth was sold to the University of Hong Kong in 1954 and converted into a student dormitory "University Hall", Bethanie House served as a community centre for the French Foreign Mission until 1975. It was decided by the HK administration in 2003 that Bethanie should be restored, and massive architectural reconstruction was undertaken.

Bethanie's story has been documented in Alain Le Pichon's book, "Bethanie and Nazareth: French secrets from a British Colony". Pichon is a French historian turned banker turned professor at the Sorbonne, who has lived in Hong Kong for

more than 40 years.

Today, Bethanie House is open to the public, with daily guided tours in three languages (English, Cantonese and Putonghua). The site is composed of a main H-shaped building with its attendant chapel, a museum that will occupy the cellars and a theatre housed in the octagonal cowsheds.

While the grounds and the basement museum are both open to the general public, Bethanie Chapel, Sir Y K Pao Studio, and the Wellcome Theatre are only accessible as part of the official tour.

The Chinese University Women's Organization (CUWO) is planning a visit to Bethanie House in March. Details will be posted in the March issue of Campus Community News.

What amazes me in Hong Kong is the depth and quantity of performances offered on the cultural scene. At this time of the year, we're in full swing of the Hong Kong Arts Festival, which began on 6 February and continues until 8 March; therefore this column is largely consecrated to it. However, look beyond to find other events that don't make up part of this festival – there is certainly something for everyone somewhere in town! For the arts festival, tickets can often be purchased at the last minute (check with URBTIX first!) for certain shows and some lower-profile performances are good value especially if you haven't paid attention to my warnings of booking well in advance for the "big" events. Here are listings of a few that still have seats available as of 7 February but this can change abruptly --you can always check before making a trip to your local URBTIX at 2734-9009 for ticket availability (useful posters indicating what events still have tickets are found at URBTIX outlets

in Shatin Town Hall, City Hall, and at the TST Cultural Centre). You can also refer to the Arts Festival's informative website for updates at: www.hk.artsfestival.org or phone URBTIX at 2734-9009.
